At Eden we have to do what they call "Contextual Education." This is a program where you get out of the classroom and experience how theology works in the real world. They require you do this ten hours a week. For me it was not an experience I was looking forward to. I was working about 25 hours a week and being a full time seminary student. My time was precious already, and this just seemed like another thing that would steal the minutes away from my already hectic life. Going into it, however, I did know that if I was going to do this I wanted to do something that I may not get the chance to experience otherwise. That's how I ended up as a hospital chaplain.

Going into the job I was terrified. I had no idea what to expect. My mind always jumps to the worst case scenario, and this was no exception. I was having these visions of being turned loose into a hospital full of dying people and not having ANY idea how to handle them. Being sent into the room of someone you don't know was a terrifying thing. Wracked with nervousness and fear, I reported to my first day of work.

Fast forward a month and I was fine. I absolutely loved working with the people on my floor. Being able to see people being helped was amazing. While it's true I didn't know the people I was going to visit, I would go into their room a stranger and be able to have them open up about their fears and their joys. It was absolutely amazing, and there were times you could see them almost having a weight lifted off their shoulders. Had I given into my fears, I would have never gotten this experience.

Fear is a constant factor in life and often times "not having faith in our faith" is a problem within the church. I'm not saying that everyone's faith is perfect or that any of us are the next coming of Jesus, but our faith is enough. We want to be stronger in our faith and closer to God, but being able to have faith in your faith is a great blessing. After all it wasn't those who knew they were righteous that Jesus was after, but it was the meek, the poor, the downtrodden, and the broken. When the spiritual panic sets in, being able to say "I may not have the strongest faith but my faith is enough" can help to calm any storm. It's not necessarily about being able to be the beacon and pinnacle of what a Christian should model themselves after but being able to recognize our fears and have faith we'll get through them opens us up to a host of blessings.

Faith is not something we should ever quit working at, but it is something that we need to realize is enough. The faith we have is strong enough to help us through the storms. If we can continue to grow that faith, we can accomplish wonderful things. As Jesus said, "If you have faith the size of a mustard seed you can move mountains."

# Fall Adult Sunday School Summer-Fall Reading List

In November, Adult Sunday School will consider "Racism and National Security" in the context of the internment of Japanese Americans during World War II. The summer-fall reading list for this topic is:

- A Farewell to Manzanar by Jeanne
  Wakatsuki Houston "is the true story of
  one spirited Japanese American family's
  attempt to survive the indignities of forced
  detention...and of a native-born American
  child who discovered what it was like to
  grow up behind barbed wire in the United
  States." [dust jacket copy]
- Snow Falling on Cedars by David Guterson. "San Piedro Island, north of Puget Sound, is a place so isolated that no one who lives there can afford to make enemies. But in 1954 a local fisherman is found suspiciously drowned, and a Japanese American named Kabuo is charged with his murder. In the course of the ensuing trial, it becomes clear that what is at stake is more than one man's guilt. For on San Piedro, memory grows as thickly as cedar trees and the fields of ripe strawberries-memories of a charmed love affair between a white boy and the Japanese girl who grew up to become Kabuo's wife; memories of land desired, paid for, and lost. Above all, San Piedro is haunted by the memory of what happened to its Japanese residents during World War II, when an entire community was sent into exile while its neighbors watched." [dust jacket copy]
- Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet by Jamie Ford explores the experience of Japanese Americans in the Seattle area during World War II in the context of a love story between a Chinese boy and a Japanese American girl who was sent to the Minidoka camp in Idaho.


On Sunday, September 8, there will be a "Back to Church" potluck meal in the fellowship hall after the morning worship service.



# A New Beginning

There are very few times in your life when you are absolutely sure you have chosen the right path or know you are in exactly the right place, but that is how I feel here in Hungary. There has been more hospitality and generosity poured out to me in the past four months than I ever could have imagined. I was called to Budapest, Hungary because I have a talent that directly aligns to an expressed need, and what may seem like a menial task of writing or proofresding is more helpful than we as native English speakers.

or proofreading is more helpful than we, as native English speakers, could ever imagine. I say this because Hungary, linguistically, is extremely isolated. Their language is very difficult and very unique. It is also a language that essentially does not exist outside the borders of Hungary. Yet, there is a wealth of information being showcased by the church's communication department, but because it is written in Hungarian, few outside of the borders will understand it. This means any news article or update has to be translated into English or German, which, in a time when the worldwide church is more connected than it has ever been, international ties and relations are essential.

I see my place as a communicator, telling the Hungarian churches' story. I see that I'm a vital cog in this machine. But I often get this feeling that I am not doing substantial enough work to fit the term "real missionary." I learned that the definition of mission is that our worth is a direct result of the work we do. So I ask myself, since when did productivity become the deciding factor in a relationship? Shouldn't a partnership be about supporting each other and learning from one another while our journeys of faith overlap in a certain place for a finite amount of time? I conclude, it is our challenge to live our lives in a way that is pleasing to God, which means living our lives with the purpose and knowledge that we are but a tiny part of Christ's body.

Let us pray that our work is focused on relationships more than the measuring of accomplishments, knowing God's mission touches all people.
